

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexico's asparagus supply is rising but still below normal, with good quality, smaller sizes; Peru's volumes will increase by early December, keeping markets firm.

Blackberries: Markets steady, but Mexican shipments delayed by labor strike road blockades.

Brussel Sprouts: Brussels sprout supplies are very limited due to insect pressure, decay, and small sizing.

Cantaloupe: Westside cantaloupe supplies are low, keeping prices high with mostly 9s; sizing is limited, with offshore arrivals expected by mid-November.

Grapes: Grape supplies are tightening, pushing markets up, with greens tighter than reds for the season.

Lettuce (iceberg): Huron production is up with better weights than Salinas, but demand still exceeds supply, pushing value-added prices higher.

Lettuce Leaf: Demand exceeds supply for romaine and leaf greens; weights are light, value-added prices high, and Huron production is moderate.

Strawberries: Market is tight with demand exceeding supply; limited Central Mexico and Florida harvests will slowly ease pressure over November.

CROP UPDATES

Cooler, drier weather in the West is easing some crop pressures, but storm impacts still affect quality and weights for lettuce and leafy greens. Mexican imports and Huron harvests provide limited relief ahead of the full desert transition around Nov 17. California navels have started, Valencia tapers, and District 3 lemons improve, while berries remain tight, especially strawberries, with modest gains in raspberries, blackberries, and blueberries. Supply and quality issues persist, making careful planning essential.

WEATHER

California: High pressure keeps temps near to above average through the weekend, with lows in the 40s–50s and highs 70s–80s. Offshore winds ease Thursday, allowing coastal cooling as the marine layer returns.

Mexico: Warm, mostly dry weather continues through the weekend, with highs 70s–80s and lows 40s–50s.

Florida: A few evening sprinkles are possible Wednesday in Northern Florida, followed by cooler, drier mornings and warmer days late in the week.

Arizona: Low desert stays 5–10°F above normal through the weekend, with highs 80s–90s, lows 50s–60s, and winds easing after Wednesday.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees several challenges. From Non-Domiciled CDL laws affecting driver availability, the Sikh Religious Holiday of Diwali also creating an active freight market. This is in addition to transition into winter growing regions and the near end of the Salinas growing season. Add in some rain and transition is officially upon us. <u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

Mexico's asparagus volume is rising from Baja California Sur and Sonora as new fields open ahead of Thanksgiving, though yields remain low from earlier rain. Production in Caborca, Hermosillo, and Sonoyta is strong but about half of last year's, with good quality and smaller sizes. Peru's northern fields are ramping up, with heavier arrivals expected by early December. Overall supply is improving but still below normal, keeping markets firm, especially on larger sizes.

The market remains extremely tight, with demand exceeding supply. Shorter daylight hours and cooler temperatures are contributing to reduced yields. We anticipate this limited supply trend to continue throughout November. Central Mexico production is expected to increase over the next few weeks, helping to offset some of the excess demand currently being experienced in California. Florida will begin harvest next week in a very limited capacity, with only pallet quantities being harvested as crews work to maintain the ranches until the full season begins in 3–4 weeks.



Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

High pressure and offshore flow will keep temperatures near to above average through the weekend. Wednesday morning lows will range from the low 40s to mid-50s, with daytime highs in the mid-70s to low-80s near the coast and low to upper 80s inland. Offshore winds weaken Thursday, allowing temperatures to cool closer to normal as the coastal marine layer rebuilds through the weekend.



MEXICO

Warm, seasonal temps will continue through the weekend, with slightly cooler mornings early in the week under high pressure. Highs will reach the low 70s to low 80s, and lows will range from the low 40s to low 50s through Friday, rising to upper 40s to mid-50s over the weekend. Aside from a sprinkle or two, mostly dry weather is expected through November 2nd.



FLORIDA

A slight chance of evening or nighttime sprinkles is expected across Northern and North-Central Florida Wednesday from a cold front. Cooler, drier air will follow late October, bringing cool mornings and gradually warmer daytime temperatures over the weekend.



ARIZONA

Low desert temperatures will run 5–10°F above normal through the weekend under a persistent high-pressure ridge. Highs will reach the upper 80s to mid-90s, with morning lows in the upper 50s to mid-60s. Moderate, gusty northerly winds continue through Wednesday afternoon, then ease to light and variable through Sunday.



Grop Updates

Weather Relief Brings Some Stability, But Supply

Pressure Remains

We're finally catching a bit of a break weather-wise out West. Cooler nights and drier afternoons have helped ease some insect pressure and dry out fields that were hammered by nearly 1.5 inches of rain earlier this month. That said, the impact of those storms is still being felt across the board. Lighter weights, increased trimming, and quality concerns continue to affect many row crops as the Salinas season nears its end.



On the brighter side, supplies of lettuce and leaf items from Mexico are picking up, crossing through South Texas with decent quality. This additional supply is helping soften demand pressure on the West Coast and keeping markets from climbing further. Huron is fully underway, providing a small bridge between Salinas and the desert. Quality and yields have been solid so far, but the region's volume is limited and won't be a long-term fix. We're still on track for the full transition to the desert growing region the week of November 17.

In citrus, California navels have officially kicked off with early sizing peaking on 72s and 88s. Valencia volume continues to taper off, and District 3 lemons are coming on stronger, with improving quality and supply.

Berry markets are still tight. Strawberries remain in a demand-exceeding supply situation, with yields improving slightly in Oxnard but still not enough to meet full demand. Central Mexico is slowly increasing production, but volumes remain light. Raspberry and blackberry supply is snug but showing signs of improvement, while blueberry availability continues to increase with steady Peruvian arrivals.

As always, we'll stay close to the field. Inconsistent supply and quality concerns will linger until we're fully transitioned to the desert. We don't expect to see major gaps, but it's a sensitive time in the season, and planning remains key.
